## Other Helpful Information:

Things you should know about church funerals: The casket is always closed for an Episcopal service, and when the funeral is in the church, the casket or urn is covered with a funeral pall. There is, traditionally, no eulogy in the Episcopal service, though a 5 minute/600-word eulogy may be shared if submitted to the priest beforehand: this allows the priest to assist if the reader becomes overwhelmed, which happens more often than people often think. A homily will be preached: be sure to let the priest know if there is any part of the deceased's story you would like them to hold in mind as they prepare the message.

In lieu of flowers (except for altar flowers), memorials may be given to the church or some other organization, as a way to help the living. Would you like to leave instructions for such gifts?
